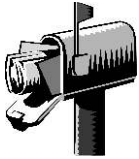

Report From Kenya

Hi brethren,

Happy to greet you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. At this moment, when the entire nations of the world people live in fear, scared, and threatened with the death from Corona virus, we should all the time think of others. I have been praying, thinking of what might be the situation with you brethren, since the U.S is really badly affected. We see in the news broadcast over the radios and televisions how the situation is over there. I hope you are well in the hands of our Lord Jesus Christ. We at this end are not as badly affected as you over there.

The government has directed everyone to stay at home. It is quite unfortunate since most people live a hand to mouth life. They must go out in the morning to work so that in the evening they might have some food on the table. Some run small business, like selling vegetables. My wife has been doing that; now she can't go out to look for something to sell. Nairobi, Mombasa, and Kilifi are the main towns affected with Corona virus; therefore right now there is no going or coming out Nairobi and Mombasa. The number of infected persons is 184, seven are dead. Everything has

come to a standstill. We try as much as we can to communicate through mobile phones and by chance by sending e-mail. Bro. Laban called me some two weeks ago. He informed me of the death of a newly converted brother near Buhura in Kakamega who lost his wife. I came to learn from the person concerned that he was my student many years ago. His name is George Omulama. Had it not been for this curfew not to travel to far places, I would have traveled to Kakamega.

We now pray to our Almighty God to protect us all. We thank you brethren for your great concern and prayers.

Fortunately I got a chance to go and see my doctor today. I was not feeling well therefore I had to go and collect some medicine as well as for checkup. Other brethren like John Mbithi, Johnstone Muteti, (Machakos), Milton Owanga, John Otunga (Sio Port), Samuel Sambu from junction Londian called and told me to write to thank you and greet you. They are all praying for you. I had to try as much as I could to write and at least update you dear brethren.

May we continue to pray for him and his family so that God can open the ways for him to get out of hospital bed. We also got a call from Shirati, Bro. Julius Kachege is sick of Malaria and flu; may we continue to pray for him also.

Dear Brethren, we're praying you're all safe and in good health and good faith because this is a very trying moment of our faith. It is such a very tough time that can only be handled respectively by our Almighty God! Amen.

With deep sorrow I am sorry to inform you that this morning sad news has reached me. We have lost 3 brothers in Christ and one sister. One brother and sister have passed on due to lack of their daily pills for high blood pressure and diabetics. Their pills got finished that they could hardly survive without. Then the two brothers, one was bitten by the snake from the pit latrine, one had AIDS but when his medicine got finished, he began developing some symptoms and he lost hope on how to get more, so he got a rope and killed himself. This is very unfortunate but we pray for God to rest them in peace.

Am still trying to figure out how I can reach the hospital for medicines of our brothers and sisters with special medical needs, because we are likely to lose many lives who for long have

been surviving from our church's responsibility to deliver to them medicine at our church clinic. Now that our clinic is closed due to National shutdown, I can only get the medicine for special cases from the hospital free of charge and deliver to them.

Praying you are able to support in any way possible to save these innocent lives of God's rural needy!!
