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## Quit You Like Men

“*Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men.*” (1 Cor. 16:13).

These words are not unique to the apostle Paul, nor for that matter, to the Bible. In many ways and in various forms they have been repeated to soldiers (spiritual and carnal) throughout the pages of history.

The ancient Scot was encouraged to “Stand every man in his place and not flee as a frightened bird” in the face of the enemy.

In our own historical context, the citizen-soldier was urged to “not fire until you see the whites of their eyes”. It took exceptional courage to stand in the face of an enemy bent on one’s destruction.

We owe those old colonists a debt of gratitude for standing their ground with courage; they *quit themselves like men*.

Where does all this lead us? Obviously we, as Christians, are not to fight a carnal war against our enemies. 2 Cor. 10:4, “...*the weapons of our warfare are not carnal...*”.

But Christians DO have a warfare to fight. 1 Tim. 1:18, “*This charge I commit unto thee, son Timothy, according to the prophecies which went before on thee, that thou by them mightest war a good warfare*”. Also, note 1 Tim. 6:12, “*Fight the good fight of faith...*”.

Our warfare, as Christians, consists of, “...*(weapons) mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds; Casting down imaginations, and every thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and*



*bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ.” (2 Cor. 10:4-5).*

This is a universal admonition; even the enemies of God use it. As recorded in 1 Sam. 4:9, the Philistines, a wicked, idolatrous people who were at war with Israel, heard a great shout from the Israelite camp (the ark of the covenant had returned to Israel) and, being frightened, were encouraged to, *“Be strong, and quit yourselves like men, O ye Philistines, that ye be not servants unto the Hebrews, as they have been to you: quit yourselves like men and fight.”*

In short, the phrase means all the attributes normally considered to be *manly*.

But what use and to what purpose do the scriptures allot these traits?

## **We Are At War**

2 Tim. 2:3, *“Thou endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life; that he may please him who hath chosen him to be a soldier.”*

We should not be blinded to the fact that war, of whatever sort, is an activity that must be prosecuted with vigor, in order to win. (Who ever fought in a war to lose?) To properly fight a war, one must use the weapons at his disposal to destroy the enemies’ resistance: also to defend himself against the enemies’ attacks.

## **Prove All Things**

1 Thess. 5:21, *“Prove all things; hold fast that which is good.”* Eph. 5:10, *“Proving what is acceptable to the Lord.”* Rom. 12:2, *“And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.”*

If we attempt to bring our worldly “baggage” with us when we enter the church, we are not renewing our minds. How can we then know

what is that “good, acceptable, and perfect will of God”?

But, if we discard the preoccupations with the world and all that goes with it, we will have renewed our minds, and are beginning to *prove* all things.

Having done this, we have taken the only offensive (attack) weapon provided by our “captain”. We have no other means to attack our many enemies. But how are we to fight? And what are to be our tactics?

## **Our Weapons Are Spiritual**

Paul tells us *“...to be carnally (fleshly) minded is death...the carnal mind is enmity against God: ...it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.”* (Rom. 8:6-7). If we who are spiritually minded attempt to prove all things with a carnal mind, we cannot possibly succeed: we could never fight a spiritual warfare. *“So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God.”* (Rom. 8:8).

## **We Must Make A Stand**

Paul relates how that during a severe trial, all of his companions deserted him; he stood alone in Nero’s (probably) court in defense of himself. 2 Tim. 4:16, *“At my first answer no man stood with me, but all men forsook me...”* How many times does it seem that we are standing alone in our lives?

## **Quit You Like Men**

Paul was undaunted. He knew what so many of us fail to recognize today; that the “Lord with yourself is a majority of two.” 2 Tim. 4:17, *“Notwithstanding the Lord stood with me, and strengthened me...and I was delivered out of the mouth of the lion.”* If we are obedient to the Lord’s will in all our activities, He will never abandon us. 2 Tim. 4:18, *“...the Lord shall*

*deliver me from every evil work, and will preserve me unto his heavenly kingdom....”*

It takes courage to take a stand in the face of the disapproval and opposition of others but courage is the first “Christian virtue” that we are told to “add to our faith”. Peter tells us in 2 Pet. 1:5, “...*add to your faith virtue...*”. Virtue in its essence is courage. We should never fail to fight the “good fight” when the necessity is presented to us. To do so would be cowardly.

Too many times, we are presented with challenges aimed at our beliefs and we shy away from our responsibilities of battle. If we are fully

armed, both with the “sword of the spirit” and the “whole armor of God”, what have we to fear?

Our weapons will be the subject of another study, complete in itself.

So brethren, let us always “stand each one in his place” when the call comes and not abandon the field to the enemy! In doing so, we will be *quitting ourselves like men*.

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## Dearly Beloved Fellow-Labourer

Philemon is one of the shortest and least-utilized books in the New Testament. There is just one chapter of 25 verses. Yet there is a lot of meaning there.

Among many things we can learn, there are three aspects of Christian fellowship in this short book of Philemon. These three aspects of fellowship are to be fellow-labourers, fellow-soldiers and fellow-prisoners of Jesus Christ.

The first is revealed in the very first verse. “*Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ, and Timothy our brother, unto Philemon our dearly beloved, and fellowlabourer*”.

Imagine how good it would feel to receive a letter from the apostle Paul that addressed you as “*dearly beloved*” and “*fellow labourer*”. Although Paul was putting Philemon into a stressful situation in attempting to reconcile him to Onesimus, a greeting like that would certainly feel wonderful.

But it was more than just a greeting. Paul was acknowledging the good work that Philemon had done as a Christian. Read verses 4-7, “*I thank my God, making mention of thee always in my*

*prayers, Hearing of thy love and faith, which thou hast toward the Lord Jesus, and toward all saints; That the communication of thy faith may become effectual by the acknowledging of every good thing which is in you in Christ Jesus. For we have great joy and consolation in thy love, because the bowels of the saints are refreshed by thee, brother.*”

When we work together, our names are written in Heaven, as we read in Phil. 4:3, “*And I intreat thee also, true yokefellow, help those women which laboured with me in the gospel, with Clement also, and with other my fellowlabourers, whose names are in the book of life.*”

When we help our brothers and sisters in Christ, we are doing good for Jesus. Matt. 25: 40, “*And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.*”

We are fellow-labourers not only with each other, but with God as well. I Cor. 3:9, “*For we are labourers together with God: ye are God’s husbandry, ye are God’s building.*”

Others were recognized as fellow-laborers as well, in Philemon verse 24, "*Marcus, Aristarchus, Demas, Lucas, my fellow-labourers.*"

The second aspect of fellowship is found in the second verse of Philemon, "*And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house*".

The life of a Christian is often a difficult fight. The world throws so much at us, and at our children. 2 Tim. 2:3-4, "*Thou therefore endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life; that he may please him who hath chosen him to be a soldier.*"

But we don't have to fight this battle alone. We have each other as fellow-soldiers. 1 Pet. 5:8-9, "*Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour: Whom resist stedfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world.*" And we have God on our side, and he ensures our ultimate victory, 1 Cor. 15:57, "*But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.*"

God gives us armor to defend us and a weapon to wield. Eph. 6:14-18, "*Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God: Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints.*" Note that there is no sheath for the sword. Use the word of God constantly, every day. And note that watching and praying are also important elements of our armor.

We read the third aspect of fellowship revealed in the book of Philemon in verse 23, "*There salute thee Epaphras, my fellowprisoner in Christ Jesus.*"

Paul had become a prisoner for preaching the name of Jesus, as we see in Acts 28:16-17, "*And when we came to Rome, the centurion delivered the prisoners to the captain of the guard: but Paul was suffered to dwell by himself with a soldier that kept him. And it came to pass, that after three days Paul called the chief of the Jews together: and when they were come together, he said unto them, Men and brethren, though I have committed nothing against the people, or customs of our fathers, yet was I delivered prisoner from Jerusalem into the hands of the Romans.*"

Others in that day were imprisoned for their faith as well. In addition to Epaphras in the book of Philemon, we read in Rom. 16:7, "*Salute Andronicus and Junia, my kinsmen, and my fellow prisoners, who are of note among the apostles, who also were in Christ before me.*" And in Col. 4:10 we see another example, "*Aristarchus my fellowprisoner saluteth you, and Marcus, sister's son to Barnabas, (touching whom ye received commandments: if he come unto you, receive him;)*".

Though he was bound as a prisoner, he continued his work of preaching Jesus Christ to any and all who would listen. And his commitment to his duty inspired others, Phil. 1:12-14, "*But I would ye should understand, brethren, that the things which happened unto me have fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the gospel; So that my bonds in Christ are manifest in all the palace, and in all other places; And many of the brethren in the Lord, waxing confident by my bonds, are much more bold to speak the word without fear.*"

May we, like Paul and others of that day, continue to stand up and preach Jesus

unashamed in the face of this evil world. 2 Tim. 1:8, “Be not thou therefore ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, nor of me his prisoner: but be thou partaker of the afflictions of the gospel according to the power of God”.

There is much more that we can learn from the book of Philemon. But we wanted to focus in this article on these three aspects of fellowship. Fellowship is all the good times we have when together; but it is also working together, fighting against Satan together, and often suffering together. We need to be there for each other in good times and bad, as we read in Rom. 12:15,

“Rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep.”

Don’t ignore the little books of the Bible. Let us study it all, and apply it to our lives, so that we can be recognized by God on the day of Judgment as dearly beloved fellow-labourers.

Dear Brethren in Christ:

Receive my most sincere greeting and hope that on receiving this letter you are enjoying all the blessings of God.

Thank you for your fellowship with me in this work. As Paul says to the Philippians 1:3-6, *“I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, Always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy, For your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now; Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ.”*

I inform you that in January and during the first week in February I had much of the Lord’s work between the faithful churches in different places of Mexico (Matamoros, Veracruz, and Tampico areas). In the churches of Matamoros and Tampico areas we had baptisms and the churches continue growing in number and in faith.



Some brothers of these churches have families in other cities, so I am studying with several of these people and hope that in time we will have new brothers in these cities, as well. Also, I mention that after working in the city of

Brownsville, TX, on the Sunday of February 4<sup>th</sup>, a new church was begun with 5 new brothers. These new brothers are of Mexican origin.

This new church in Brownsville, TX, will have meetings only on Sundays at 5:30 p.m. in a house of one of the members; and if the Lord helps us, after a time maybe rent a house for meetings. In Brownsville, Matamoros, and Vallehermoso, we have many contacts, and for



that reason during the evening four days a week I am studying with these people.

Some faith brethren in different places in Mexico inform me that the brethren remain firm, and the evangelists are preaching at different places according to the plans that each of them have. Also, I have received letters and telephone calls from evangelists in Guatemala and El Salvador. They inform me that the churches there continue firm in the truth. They also mention that they have persecutions for their cause of preaching (on the autonomy of the local churches, not on the division of classes), however they are all firm in the truth.

I have plans during the next weeks to visit some faithful churches in Mexico, and if the Lord wills, I plan to visit some churches in Guatemala.

I have hopes that the Lord will help me in the Lord’s work in the churches in Mexico and will

help me in my secular work so that I will have the time necessary to travel to these places.
